INTRODUCTION TO TODAY'S WORSHIP SERVICE

Jesus shows us the full extent of God's love for us. The Church calls this day "Maundy" because of Jesus' "new command" (Latin: "novum mandatum") in John 13:34-35, that his followers "love one another" as he has loved us. The Gospel readings for this day in two years of the three-year lectionary cycle focus on Jesus' institution of the Lord's Supper, while in the third lectionary-year focusing on Jesus' command for humility and love. Jesus shows the full extent of his love in both service and sacrifice. He loves us more than life itself, and feeds us his flesh and blood in the Lord's Supper to prove it. Having been reconciled to God through the flesh and blood of Christ, we now follow his command to love each other as he has loved us – with selfless, self-sacrificing love.

The action of ceremonially stripping the altar at the end of the service prepares the chancel and the congregation for the solemn worship of Good Friday. The service concludes today without a blessing, since conceptually this service continues through the Good Friday service tomorrow to its conclusion in the service on Easter Sunday.

Regarding the Lord's Supper and "Close Communion"

Our Lord Jesus has given us a holy Supper in which we receive his true body and blood for the forgiveness of sins and the strengthening of our faith. In this Supper, we celebrate the gift of his redemption, we bear witness to the fellowship we share as confessors of the truth, and we proclaim his death until he returns.

Following the teaching of the Bible (1 Corinthians 10:17; 11:27-29; etc.), our church practices "close communion." We ask that only those who are communicant members of this church or another congregation of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS) or Evangelical Lutheran Synod (ELS) partake of the sacrament today. If you are a visitor who is not a member of one of our sister churches, our pastor would be happy to speak with you about receiving the Lord's Supper with us in the future. Please mention it to him after the service.

Communicant members may wish to prepare for the Lord's Supper using the "Personal Preparation for Holy Communion" on p. 156 in the front part of the hymnal (the red book in the pew rack: Christian Worship).

FIRST READING - Exodus 12:1-14 (EHV)

The LORD told Moses and Aaron this in the land of Egypt:

²This month is to be the beginning of your calendar. It is to be the first month of the year for you. ³Tell the entire Israelite community that on the tenth day of this month, they are to take a lamb or a young goat^c for themselves, according to their fathers' households, one lamb per household. ⁴But if the household is too small for a whole lamb, then that person and his neighbor next door to him must select one, based on the number of people. Determine what size lamb is needed according to how much each person will eat.

⁵Your lamb must be unblemished, a year-old male. You may take it from the sheep or the goats. ⁶You are to keep it until the fourteenth day of this month. Then the whole assembly of the Israelite community is to slaughter the lambs at sunset.^{d 7}They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses where they eat the lamb. ⁸That night they shall eat the meat that has been roasted over a fire, along with unleavened bread. They shall eat it with bitter herbs. ⁹Do not eat it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over a fire with its head, its legs, and its internal organs. ¹⁰You shall not leave any of it until the morning. Whatever remains until the morning, you shall burn in the fire. ¹¹This is how you are to eat it: with your cloak tucked into your belt ready for travel,^e your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand. Eat it in haste. It is the LORD's Passover.

¹²For on that night I will pass through the land of Egypt. I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both people and animals. Against all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgment. I am the LORD. ¹³The blood will be a sign for you on

the houses where you are. When I see the blood, I will pass over you. There will be no plague among you to destroy you when I strike down the land of Egypt.

¹⁴This day shall be a memorial for you, and you are to celebrate it as a festival to the LORD. Throughout your generations you must celebrate it as a permanent regulation.



INSTRUCTION FOR THE END OF LENT

M: In this Lenten season we have heard again how our Lord walked the path of suffering which led him to the cross for our salvation. We have also heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and one another. This is the struggle to which we were committed at Baptism. God's forgiveness and the power of his Spirit to amend our lives continue with us because of his love for us in Jesus our Savior.

Within the family of the Church, God never wearies of giving peace and new life. In the absolution, we receive forgiveness as from God himself. This absolution we should not doubt, but firmly believe that our sins are thus forgiven before God in heaven, for it comes to us in the name and by the command of our Lord.

We who receive God's love in Jesus Christ are called to love one another, to be servants to each other, as Jesus became our servant.

In Holy Communion, the members of Christ's body participate most intimately in his love. Remembering our Lord's Last Supper with his disciples, we eat the bread and drink the cup of this meal. Together we receive the Lord's gift of his body and blood for forgiveness and participate in that new covenant that makes us one with him and one another. The Lord's Supper is the promise of the great banquet we will share with all the faithful when our Lord returns, the joyous culmination of our reconciliation with God and each other.

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

M: Let us confess our sins to God and ask for his forgiveness.

KNEEL OR STAND

M: The almighty God has been merciful to us and has sent his Son to die for all. For his sake, God forgives our sins and calls us from darkness to his marvelous light.

Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

- M: Our Lord Jesus Christ has forgiven us and reconciled us to God and has promised us the power to forgive and love each other. Relying on his promise, therefore, be reconciled with one another.
- M/C: Brothers and sisters, may the peace of Christ rule in our hearts, in our words, and in our actions.

PRAYER OF THE CHURCH

- M: Lord God, heavenly Father, author of the everlasting covenant and giver of the cup of salvation,
- C: We gather in your courts to offer you our sacrifice of thanksgiving.
- M: For fulfilling your promise to establish a new covenant through the blood of your Son, Jesus Christ,
- C: We give you humble and hearty thanks.
- M: As our Lord Jesus Christ gave thanks to you when he broke the bread, as he gave thanks to you when he took the cup,
- C: We also give you thanks.

- M: Precious Savior, both Priest and offering, awe and wonder fill our hearts as we partake of your body, broken for us, and your blood, shed for us.
- C: We praise you, bless you, and adore you, Lord Jesus Christ.
- M: In our poverty of righteousness, we have nothing to offer. Without your tremendous sacrifice, we would still be in our sins,
- C: But through your sacrament of the New Testament, we are assured that our iniquities are forgiven and our sins are no longer remembered.


WORDS OF INSTITUTION


M: The peace of the Lord be with you always.

DISTRIBUTION

At the direction of the usher, communicant members of St. Andrew and our sister churches in the WELS and ELS may come forward down the center aisle, then wait until directed by an usher to go to the communion rail. Communicants may kneel or stay standing. Please hold out your hand to receive the bread. If you wish to partake of the common cup, do not take an individual cup when the assistant comes by with the tray. Those who need to receive grape juice instead of wine may take the purple individual cups in the center of the tray. The minister and assistant will use hand sanitizer before and/or wear sterile gloves during communion setup and distribution. Gluten-free wafers are available; please speak with the pastor or an usher to receive one.



PRAYER

- M: O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good.

- M: We give thanks, almighty God, that you have refreshed us with this holy supper. We pray that through it you will strengthen our faith in you and increase our love for one another. STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

Psalm 88 is read by a lector. During the reading of the psalm, the altar is solemnly stripped, in token of Jesus' abandonment by his disciples and in preparation for the Good Friday worship service.

Do the spirits of the dead rise up and praise you?

¹¹Is your mercy declared in the tomb, vour faithfulness in decay? ¹²Is your wonderful work known in the darkness? Is your righteousness known in the land of forgetfulness? ¹³But I cry to you, O LORD, and in the morning my prayer comes before you. ¹⁴Why, O LORD, do you reject my soul? Why do you hide your face from me? ¹⁵I have been afflicted and I have been close to death since my youth. I have endured your terrors. I am in despair. ¹⁶Your rage has swept over me. Your terrors have destroyed me. ¹⁷All day long they surround me like water. They have battered me completely. ¹⁸You have distanced my loved one and friend from me. My only friend is darkness.

After the stripping of the altar, the minister exits the chancel in silence. The congregation may remain for prayer and meditation before dispersing quietly.

The paraments are purple for the season of Lent. Purple, like black, is a penitential color. Purple dye was also very expensive in the ancient world and was therefore worn mostly by royalty; the Bible records that, as the Roman soldiers mocked and tortured Jesus on Good Friday, they put a purple robe on him to ridicule him and belittle the claim that he was a king. Therefore, purple is used during this penitential season of Lent as a vivid reminder of the contempt and scorn Jesus endured, and the sacrifice he made for our eternal salvation.
